With that we went to the other room...slowly one by one about 12 or more guys came over. I just read comforting passages and prayed and spoke the hope of the gospel. Another of the guys also read a prayer. This was amazing as I've never been able to connect in the fraternities. I see this as an open door and want you to pray for that. My student is going to suggest that I come over again...so pray that there might be a consistent start to something like a Bible study here. Focus on Joe Dentici



Perhaps most widely known for their enthusiasm for football, Penn State students exert a similar degree passion and dedication to all aspects of their lives. Joe Dentici, the Ruf minister, describes the campus culture as "work hard, play harder." The students are driven academically and socially. Believing they have no limits, they pursue their goals doggedly. But recently,

Joe has seen God transform this culture for His glory.

During student leadership meetings, Joe outlines a vision for the ministry, and the students quickly implement the vision. For example, the ministry was struggling to find a single, effective platform to advertise RUF events. Many students no longer use Facebook, or use it with a myriad of other social apps, making Facebook an increasingly obsolete way to announce upcoming events. Does anyone have a better idea? Joe asked the students. The students decided to create a page on Penn State's portal dedicated to RUF. Through the portal, the information can be accessed easily by all students at Penn State.

Not only are students taking initiative, but Joe has also noticed RUF members express an increased passion for serving God. Recently, the student president of RUF changed his major to one that would allow him to study theology in preparation for the ministry. He is considering becoming a RUF intern next year.

More dramatically, an atheist from a Hindu family rejected both his former views and his family's heritage to embrace Christ as his savior. Since his conversion two months ago, this student eagerly reads his Bible and every book he can find on Christianity. His passion for the gospel has energized the other RUF students, who are praying for opportunities to invite friends to RUF throughout the year.

Until five years ago, Joe and his wife, Melissa, were convinced that they would never leave the Deep South, where they both grew up. Yet after serving for six years as the RUF minister at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, Joe felt called to seek a new campus. When the position became available at Penn State, Melissa suggested that they pray about the decision rather than immediately refuse to live north of the Mason-Dixon Line. Joe says that Melissa's willingness to leave their friends and family was one sign that God might be calling him to Penn State. After meeting the RUF students at Penn State, Joe and Melissa knew they had found their new home. Joe recalls that "the students loved where they were, and we could see ourselves loving them where they were."

Joe and Melissa moved to Pennsylvania with their two children, Anne Charlotte, who is now six years old, and Cannon, now four years old. Two months ago, they were joined by their youngest son, Beck. The Dentici family has discovered that they enjoy all four seasons and has found themselves immersed in a loving and warm community. As an unexpected benefit to their move, Melissa's multiple

sclerosis symptoms have become less severe. Extreme heat can aggravate M.S. Nursing and pregnancy also relieve the symptoms of Melissa's mild form of M.S., and she currently does not need to take medication.

In addition to caring for her family, Melissa supports RUF as much as possible. She enjoys meeting regularly with the RUF intern and several female students, and she will sometimes provide meals for students on campus. Melissa also prays fervently for the ministry and the students.

Melissa, Joe, and the ministry team at RUF are praying that God continues to bless the ministry and the students in RUF this year. They hope the RUF members will use their enthusiasm to learn more about Christ and to share that knowledge with others. It's a promising year, Joe reflects. "I feel as if God's having his way with us. There is a general excitement about knowing who God is and wanting to follow him in our group right now."
