However, the work is fulfilling."

Stephen got two weeks leave in August and we were delighted to have him around. He was a vital part of a home project. We decided to insulate the third floor, which meant removing the plaster ceiling. It was a mammoth job in nearly 100° temperature and 100° humidity, featuring fine plaster and slate dust. I couldn't have done it without his help.
