New York City



Focus on Nate Bower

When the members of Reformed University Fellowship at the University of Akron learned last week that they would be moving to online instruction after an extended spring break, it was not only the students that faced an unwelcome break from a busy ministry schedule. Nate Bower,



his wife Naomi, and especially his kids Ruby (6) and Wil liam (2) all miss the weekly gatherings of students and ministry teams at their home for meals, mini-retreats, and game nights. They miss fellow believers who have become their friends (as well as favorite baby-sitters!).

Nate has faith that both the campus fellowship and the city of Akron will weather this period of economic and social isolation. An alumnus of the University himself, he and his family still attend Redeemer Church (PCA) in nearby Hudson, a church his parents helped plant in 1995. After graduating with a major in Biology in 2009, Bower interned at Belhaven University in Jackson, Mississippi. In 2011 he returned to Akron – and stayed. It pays to stick around. Nate described one of the most fulfilling experiences as seeing Akron revitalize - after the tire industry was hit hard by the 2008 financial crisis. For a time it became a difficult and dangerous place to live, but recent years have seen an increase in new infrastructure and small businesses. It has given him joy to see people "taking pride in their place again." Nate and his family have put down roots here for good. The coronavirus lockdown has afforded the Bowers plenty of time together outdoors walking, hunting, and recreating at nearby national parks. It has also given them time to regroup as they prepare for the next step. After renovating their current home in preparation for its sale, next on the list is an even bigger renovation challenge. An 1870 farmhouse near the city will soon become their new home, farm animals included. University of Akron RUF students will no doubt enjoy this change!

Nate and his family's commitment to Akron has borne an enduring witness on campus since 2014, the year Nate started an Ruf chapter at the University. During normal semester operations, the fellowship offers a large group meeting as well as prayer meeting and Bible studies. This semester there is a seminar on personal responsibility in finances drawing partly from Dave Ramsey's *Total Money* Makeover. On a heavily commuter-based campus, Nate and Naomi's weekly opening of their home to the 20 to 30 members of the Akron Ruf is a message in action to the students. Many of them come from varied Christian backgrounds. Although the PCA is not particularly prominent in Ohio, RUF's reputation as a kind, welcoming, and Jesuscentered community has drawn Catholic, Nazarene, and New Mennonite students to its ranks. Still more who attend have no Christian upbringing and are encountering the gospel for the first time.

As a fellowship of intimate numbers and small staff, its members have grown close enough to experience and resolve conflicts with each other. The stresses of balancing the needs of both freshmen and job-searching seniors were not absent this year, and Nate expressed thankfulness in how God used this discovery of human weakness to bring glory to Himself and relational healing. Roughly 65% of Akron graduates, especially those in its prestigious engineering program, are drawn by Akron's corporate opportunities to stay around after graduation. The Bowers' presence and witness is therefore an investment for the long term, with much hope of return.

Spring Reflections



"For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart." Hebrews 4:12

...an oft-quoted verse, and beloved by many Christians. But I

suspect that many of us really wish it said "the *pastor* is living and active and powerful...discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart." When you are paid to do a job and devote your life to a vocation, you want it to *mean* something! You want to matter to people. When you are a

pastor or evangelist, or a parent or teacher, you want to make a difference in the lives of those you are called to serve. And justifiably so. What sort of pastors, evangelists, parents, or teachers would we be if we cared nothing for our people?

Yet the sober truth is that though we are called to serve, we do not have the ability to change others. We are not smart enough, or strong enough, or loving enough to penetrate into the hearts and minds of people, which is where lasting change occurs. So we flirt with manipulation and occasionally retreat into despondency.

The good news is that God changes people! He's been doing it for thousands of years and He is still doing it. God changes people by His word, which *does* have the power to penetrate down to our innermost being and change us all the way up.

We are seeing this right now in college students. Satan can send the coronavirus into the world to disrupt and kill, but he cannot disrupt or kill the word of God. As these students scatter all over the U.S. and the world, the word of God planted in them is active and bearing fruit. It only took a few days for students to begin meeting by video conference for prayer and Bible study. Students are flocking to online RUF meetings where our ministers continue preaching the gospel each week.

How did they know to do this? RUF ministers have been immersing students in the word of God and equipping them to read and study the scripture on their own. We have been showing them that life is found only in Jesus and comes through His word. Our goal is not to have great RUF groups, but to send strong, maturing alumni into the church and the world to serve wherever God places them. We are seeing a small foretaste of that this semester!
