

Focus on Richard Smith

"How do you handle failure?" asked the Indian doctoral student who had until this point succeeded in all his ventures. In India, he had risen to second in his field before pursuing his Ph.D. at Pennsylvania State University. Despite these achievements, he was recently passed over for a job. Richard Smith, the RUF-International minister, listened attentively to the student and then shared his own experience with failure.



Richard had had a list of tasks to accomplish one day but was frustrated at every attempt. "I decided to go to Five Guys and drown myself in grease," he

says. At the cash register, he saw a Penn State student from Chile with whom he had lost contact. As he re-established their friendship, he realized that connecting with this woman was the only task God had wanted him to accomplish. "It is really that simple," he told his Indian friend. "God has his plans for you, and you will soon learn why you didn't get that job in India."

One week later, the student was hired by Penn State. Richard was thrilled. While the student has been attending church, he has not yet embraced the faith. Hopefully, the young man will become a Christian soon and understand why God did not grant him the job.

Like their Indian friend, God upended Richard and Lynne Smith's life plans. Until two years ago, Richard had never lived further north than his South Carolina hometown, and his wife, Lynne, had only lived outside Georgia during her college years. They never imagined shoveling snow as they did this winter.

Before campus ministry, Richard shepherded Northgate Presbyterian Church in Albany, Georgia for 15 years. While there, his church began a ministry to international students enrolled in the local school, Darton State College. The church's first event was a Thanksgiving dinner attended by one student, but soon many others were participating in activities and Bible studies at Northgate.

Three years ago, Al LaCour, the RUF International Coordinator, called Richard. "I want you to move from the minor leagues to the majors," he said. Because many cultures revere their elders, RUF-I was seeking experienced, older ministers. Richard's ministry at Darton State College made him the ideal RUF-I candidate. But Richard declined. Over the next year, however, God changed his mind, leading him not only to campus ministry but -- unexpectedly -- to the Northeast.

Richard's ministry at Penn State has blossomed. With approximately 40,000 students attending, Penn State University is the sixth largest college in the U.S. More than 9,000 of those enrolled are from outside the country, mak-

ing Penn State host to the 13th largest population of international students in the U.S.

In two years Ruf-I has grown to be one of the largest international ministries at Penn State. Richard has an email list of over 230 names. His Bible studies are regularly attended by 25 students, and an additional 40 students have visited at least once. He attributes his success to his volunteers from Oakwood Presbyterian Church. Last year, Richard trained these volunteers to welcome international students into their homes and to assist with Bible studies.

RUF-I has a three-prong approach to ministry: welcome, explore, and equip. Because many international students come from cultures that emphasize hospitality, they eagerly accept invitations to dinner or events.

While students are very receptive to welcoming gestures, the next prong, exploring the gospel, is harder. The average American college student usually has a cultural understanding of Christianity and sufficient English skills to easily read the Bible. Many international students have neither. Consequently, Richard and his volunteers spend time defining words and providing context before they study the Bible. Despite these challenges, a handful of students are serious contemplating becoming Christians.

Finally, RUF-I equips Christians to return to their countries of origin. In the fall, RUF-I at Penn State will offer a class on the Apostle's Creed designed to prepare any international student who converted to Christianity to return home. By emphasizing the basics tenets of the faith, Richard hopes students will find faithful churches and be able to answer questions from skeptics or curious friends.

Next fall an intern will join Richard's ministry. She will seek to reach some of the Muslim women on campus who are not permitted to speak with men outside their family. In the past, Lynne, Richard's wife, has shared the truth with these women. When the intern arrives, Lynne will continue assisting with ESL and maintaining administrative tasks.

On the last day of 2017 spring semester, seven prominent international musicians who Richard befriended performed a concert at Oakwood. After they finished, they presented gifts to Richard and Lynne. One of the gifts was a picture of themselves framed with the words "Thank you" in each student's language. Richard became teary eyed. He says, "When things like that happen, you know that the gospel is touching lives."

"Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were uneducated, common men, they were astonished. And they recognized that they had been with Jesus." Acts 4:13

The religious leaders in Jerusalem sound a lot like some modern intellectuals. They

could not understand why Peter and John had a successful ministry considering that they were not credentialed through the established channels. Eventually they realized that what made these "uneducated, common men" different was that they had been with Jesus.

We might appear educated by having attended university and seminary, but we will only be spiritually helpful and fruitful by having been with Jesus.

The great thing about summer conference is the opportunity to be with Jesus. As Sarah said, we can be with Jesus during the school year, but a week away from our normal routines provides a priceless opportunity to still our hearts and minds and hear from Jesus more clearly. This is why summer conference is such an important part of RUF's ministry, and this is why Ruth and I love these weeks with students and ministers. The beach and the woods are wonderful, it's refreshing to be with friends, but Jesus makes summer conference a transforming experience
