

University of Delaware

This semester Ruf at the University of Delaware has been

working through the gospel of Mark in our small groups and large groups. One major theme in Mark is the suffering of Jesus. In the pivotal passage in Mark 8, just after Jesus explains how it is necessary for him to die, he goes on to say, "For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it." (Mark 8:35). In an environment where everyone is encouraged to think primarily of themselves and to pursue their goals and fulfill their desires, it is crazy to think that real life is found not in clinging to your life, but giving it up. Our semester in Mark produced numerous insights into what it means to know Jesus and follow him, but one of the most significant was the backward and upside down notion that following Jesus and living a life shaped by the cross is actually the very place where we experience life to the fullest. "Since therefore the children share in flesh and blood, he himself likewise partook of the same things, that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and deliver all those who through fear of death were subject to lifelong slavery." Hebrews 2:14-15
