## Focus on John Meinen



John Meinen began his first year of ministry at the University of Vermont with a disclaimer. "If you thought this was a dog lover's club, you've come to the wrong place." Students at UVM are frequently perplexed by the acronym RUF, pronouncing

the campus ministry "ruff" like a dog bark or "rough" as in the texture of tree bark.

In most ways, students at UVM are ordinary college students, seeking truth, their future careers, and a good slice of pizza. Yet many have had no interaction with professing Christians prior to meeting Meinen and his wife, Megan. A 2012 Gallup poll reported that Vermont was the least religious state in America – a statistic reflected by the student body at UVM, where a greater percentage of students are Jewish than Protestant.

The Meinens moved to Burlington in 2012. They spent that fall fundraising, supporting the PCA church, and settling into their new home. In the spring of 2013, they entered full-time ministry at the University of Vermont.

This fall, Meinen recruited a handful of students at student orientation. He leads weekly Bible studies attended by seven to eight students, mostly believers. Later in the school year, they were joined by a young woman who asked probing questions about God.

One freshman at Meinen's studies initially hated UVM. Fritz used to joke that God brought him to UVM to destroy his faith. Throughout the fall semester, Meinen reminded Fritz that God may lead his people into a wilderness, but he never abandons them. He fulfills the needs of those who love Him. Eventually, Fritz's attitude had transformed from anger to trust. Meinen says Fritz is excited to return to UVM next year because "he knows he will be fed here and can feed other people too."

Meinen and his wife strive to be where the students are. He exercises in the campus gym, which he has access to through Megan, who works at the university's high ropes course. Meinen and Megan attend weekly dinner at an on-campus community-focused dorm. Meinen also registered for a hockey class as a continuing education student and played on an intramural team. While his team lost most of their games, Meinen scored a few friendships.

Meinen's approach to ministry is relationship driven. He strives to understand the students' own stories, eventually connecting their personal lives with the gospel. He shows them that the Christian story is founded on the real world – "a beautiful, broken world."

"However, building trust and making gospel-connections takes time." Meinen says. Meinen anticipates more conversations with students as his relationships develop in the coming years.

Next fall, Meinen hopes to collect enough student signatures to petition the Student Government Association to allow RUF to be an official student club. The SGA's approval would allow Meinen access to important recruiting events and waive the fee he currently pays to reserve a room for Bible studies.

Meinen prays that UVM will become a known place where students will blossom in their faith. He looks forward to the day when UVM's reputation is not that of a spiritual desert, but of a garden.
